

The best time of year to travel?

Rome formed the Western civilization as we know it. For first timers, it's really hot June - August, like really hot. Roma doesn't have the best air movement throughout the city and not many accommodations offer air conditioning. The spring and fall shoulder seasons may offer travelers the best of both worlds.

Language: Italian

Currency: Euro (EUR)

Credit Cards & ATMs: Many Rome shops, restaurants, and hotels accept credit cards, but not all. Definitely carry a little bit of cash on you.

Cell Service: If you don't have an international cell phone plan, pick up an <u>AIRALO eSIM</u> - Get USD \$3.00 off with code "**NICK4202**" when you sign up or at checkout.


Plugs: The plugs in Italy are type F or L, the standard voltage is 230 V, and the standard frequency is 50 Hz. Buy a <u>universal adapter</u> and use a <u>voltage</u> <u>converter</u> for hairdryers and beard trimmers.

Food and Drinks: Pasta! Pizza! Vino! Gelato! From iconic pasta dishes like carbonara and cacio e pepe to crispy Roman-style pizza, the city celebrates the art of simplicity and quality ingredients. Indulge in the decadence of gelato or sip on a robust espresso for a true Roman culinary experience that effortlessly blends tradition with modern flair.

Thieves are very skilled and often work in groups. Be particularly vigilant in these public areas:

- all tourist sites and attractions
- beaches
- restaurants
- hotel lobbies
- transportation hubs, including bus and train stations

Pickpocketing

Busy tourist areas, public transportation, and crowded places can be hotspots for pickpocketing. Travelers are advised to keep a close eye on their belongings, use anti-theft bags, and be cautious in crowded spaces.

Traffic and Pedestrian Safety

Scams

While not widespread, some tourists may encounter scams, especially around popular attractions. Be cautious of individuals offering unsolicited help, and only use official services for tours and transportation.

Night Safety

Like in any city, it's advisable to be cautious in unfamiliar areas, especially at night. Stick to welllit, populated areas, and use reputable transportation options.

Health Precautions

Italy, including Rome, maintains high health and safety standards. Travelers should have travel insurance, be aware of emergency services, and take necessary health precautions.

By staying vigilant, being aware of surroundings, and taking standard safety measures, visitors can enjoy Rome's beauty and culture with confidence. Additionally, staying informed about the latest travel advisories from reliable sources is always a good practice.

BOOKING FLIGHTS

It's important to check flight prices as soon as you decide you're going to Rome. **FCO (Leonardo da Vinci-Fiumicino Airport)** is going to be the closest airport to Rome. Use **Google Flights** to search, compare and track flights.

Track multiple flight options with just a click of a few buttons.

A question I get often is, "**when should I book?**". There's not a science to booking the right flight, at the right time. However, there are patterns to be aware of.

For example, flights May - August will always be higher, this is peak travel season. USA Holidays will also be higher. Popular festival dates will be higher. Religious holidays will be higher.


Shoulder season is the cheapest time to book (March, April, September, October). My favorite month to travel to Europe is September! Much of the summer crowds have gone away and the weather is still warm, but not too hot.

Generally, you should book international flights around 120+ days out. Domestic flights should be booked 60 - 90+ days out.

Note: It's possible to find a cheaper flight to Naples or Florence and take a high speed train to Rome.

SETTING A BUDGET TO VALUE TRAVEL

Set a budget, even if it's a loose budget, because an adventure to Rome doesn't have to be expensive.

When deciding on what part of the Rome that you would like to stay in, keep your budget in mind, as some areas are more expensive than others.

What is **value traveling**? Value traveling is getting the most bang for your travel buck.

When it comes to saving money on your accommodations, have balance.

Value traveling will help you stretch your budget throughout your vacation. Set aside a few nights of your trip to overindulge and splurge on a luxury or unique experience. Conversely, set aside the rest of the trip's accommodations for a more practical stay.



Check out this <u>amazing apartment in the</u> <u>heart of Rome</u>.

Note: To get an idea of how much your trip will cost, research prices for airfare, hotels, and activities before you make any nonrefundable purchases or reservations.



It may cost you more, but you're paying for the experience. Counter this with booking a cheaper and more budget friendly place for the next accomodation. I wouldn't sacrifice on clean sheets and comforts, but you may want to sacrifice on amenities and location, to a certain degree.



In the end, you will notice that you will get *more value for your money* by splitting your time between accommodations – luxury and budget.

If you like to move around, stay in one neighborhood for two nights, for the best experience.

HOW TO SAVE MONEY IN ROME

Travel Points. The <u>Capital One Venture</u> <u>One</u> card is a fantastic travel rewards credit card with NO fee. However, you need good to excellent credit. If you're really serious about getting into travel reward points, consider using the <u>Capital</u> <u>One</u> or <u>Capital One Venture X</u>.

Try Shoulder Season. Flights are often cheaper in the shoulder- or offseason. Peak months are May - August. Track flights with Google Flights and jump on a great deal when Google tells you to book now!

Avoid holidays, festivals, and other large events, unless that's the reason you're going to a specific destination. Crowds can inflate hotel rates, overwhelm popular sights, and make it difficult—and costly—to get around.

Compare midweek to weekend flight and train prices. Leonardo da Vinci-Fiumicino Airport is the airport closest to Rome. There is a 30 minute express train to Termini (Rome) Station. You could also check flights to Naples (NAP) or Florence (FLR) and get a train to Rome.

Once you've estimated your trip's flight and accommodation cost, start considering the cost of transportation.

Public transportation is going to be your best bet to get around town. I would use the buses or metro, they are cheap. Just make sure to watch your belongings! You will not need to rent a car in Rome and I 100% advise against it! **Food & Gelato Budget.** I'm a foodie lover, so more likely than not, I'm finding new, fun, and interesting places to check out.



I'm not sure what a trip to Rome would look like if I was not a fan of food, but I would imagine that I would save a ton of money not eating so much pasta & pizza, not to mention, GELATO! Speaking of...

Hungry? You can find a really cheap and authentic meal away from the tourist attractions. Eating on the main street or nearby famous attractions are usually expensive because of the convenience. venture off the beaten path to save money on your food budget.

Bring a water bottle The tap water in Rome is fine to drink but buy a reusable water bottle to save money and reduce your plastic use. <u>LifeStraw</u> is my go-to brand as their bottles have built-in filters to ensure your water is always clean and safe.

Note, restaurants will charge you for bottled water. Sometimes, it's cheaper to buy a glass of wine or a beer instead!

Travel Tip: Restaurant tipping- If you see "service included", it means that the tip has already been included. It is only a 10% tip so you can add more for great service.

ITALY - FOODIE LOVERS DELIGHT

If you're visiting Rome for 4+ days, you might consider staying in two different neighborhoods.

The most popular areas to stay in are Ancient (Old) Rome and Colosseo, due to their historic nature and close proximity to the city center.

Cancellation Options & Insurance

Before booking your accommodation, make sure you know the cancellation policy. And if you think you need it, purchase trip cancellation insurance. My favorite travel credit cards include trip protection, such as the <u>Capital One</u> <u>Venture</u> card or the <u>Chase Sapphire</u> <u>Preferred</u> card.



Another reason to book using your <u>Capital</u> <u>One Venture</u> or <u>Chase Sapphire Preferred</u> card is collecting miles and points for future traveling. **That's right, more benefits for you!** Every time I travel, I'm already checking my new mileage chart for my next destination.

So, use those travel reward credit cards to get a jump start on your future travels. You may even get a round trip to Barcelona for free by just using your signup bonus miles. I did!

TravelerTip: Rome is extremely popular and the great hotels and Airbnbs book up fast. Make sure to reserve your room at least four months in advanced.

Generally, hotel rooms don't give discounts but from time to time, I post 10% booking.com coupon codes on my facebook page, <u>HERE</u>.

Q ANCIENT ROME





Often, the first question I get about Rome is, "How do I get to the city center?"



The easiest and **best option to get to your hotel** in Rome, is to hire a private driver. This is because, the second you step out of baggage claim, you have somebody waiting for you with your name on a sign.

Train Services



The **cheapest way to get to the city center** is via "*The Leonardo Express*". It's a dedicated airport train that connects Fiumicino Airport to the central Termini Station in Rome. The journey takes approximately 30 minutes, and trains depart every 15 to 30 minutes. This is a convenient and efficient option for those staying near Termini Station. <u>One Way Ticket: €19.75</u>

- The journey from Fiumicino Airport to Termini Station takes approximately 30 minutes, making it a quick and efficient way to reach the city center. Trains run every 15 to 30 minutes, providing frequent departures.
- 2. Direct Connection: The Leonardo Express is a direct train, so you won't need to make any transfers. It takes you straight from the airport to the central train station in Rome.
- 3. Reliability: The Leonardo Express is a reliable service, and you can easily plan your journey around its regular schedule.

While the <u>Leonardo Express</u> is generally the most cost-effective option, travelers should also consider factors such as convenience, luggage, and the location of their accommodations. Taxis, shuttles, and buses are alternative options, but they may take longer or involve additional transfers.

Regional FL1 Train

In addition to the Leonardo Express, there is also the FL1 regional train that stops at various stations in Rome, including Tiburtina and Ostiense. This train is a bit slower than the Leonardo Express but may be more convenient if your destination is closer to one of its stops.

Buses

Several bus services operate between Fiumicino Airport and different parts of Rome. These are generally more economical but may take longer than the train. The Terravision and SIT Bus Shuttle are examples of bus services connecting the airport to Termini Station. <u>Single</u> <u>Ticket: £6.75</u>

Trains

1. **Regional Trains (Trenitalia):** Regional trains connect Rome to nearby cities and towns.

- Fares depend on the destination and type of train.

- Tickets can be purchased at train stations, online, or through mobile apps.

Trams

- Rome has an extensive tram network serving various parts of the city.

- Trams are an efficient way to travel within neighborhoods.

- Like buses, tram tickets are typically valid for a certain duration.



2. Rome Metro:

- The Rome Metro consists of three lines (A, B, and C).

- Fares are based on a time-based system. Tickets are valid for a certain number of minutes/hours.

- There are also multi-day passes available for unlimited travel within a specified time frame.

TRAIN MAP

The Rome urban, suburban & commuter train is a transit system serving the city of Rome with the **metro**, the **tram**, the **bus** or the **night bus**. The commuter train network has 8 lines and 128 stations forming a rail network of 418 miles (672 km) plus 4 rail special lines.

Once you're in the city center, the best way to get around Rome is to walk. Rome is a very walkable city (but it's HUGE). Expect to bring a great pair of walking shoes and leave your dress shoes and high heels in your bag until the evening.



Italy has toll roads around Rome, known as autostrade, connecting major cities and regions. Travelers using these highways will encounter toll booths where they are required to pay fees based on the distance traveled. If you plan to drive around Rome or other parts of Italy, it's advisable to be prepared for toll expenses during your journey.

Travelers most often choose the Fiat Panda, while the Ford Fiesta and the Fiat 500 are also popular

If you plan to rent a car in Italy and are not from the EU, you need to get an International Driving Permit in advance of your trip. These are issued through agencies like <u>AAA</u> (US), <u>CAA</u> (Canada), the UK post office, and AAA Australia. Cost varies by country from about \$5 to \$25.



GATHER DOCUMENTATION

At least six months before your departure, make sure your ID, passport and other necessary documents are in order.

Driver's license: Most of the time, you can leave this at home. However, <u>if you are renting a car</u>, <u>you will need to show it to your</u> <u>agency</u>. Also, if you lose your passport, this is a good second form of identification.

Passport: Applying for or renewing a passport typically takes six to eight weeks, sometimes longer. However, you can pay an additional \$60 expedited service fee to get it renewed in two to three weeks, if desired. If you plan to travel outside the U.S., you need a passport. <u>Make sure your passport will not expire for at least six months after your trip is scheduled to end</u>. Some countries also require passports to have one to two blank pages for entry.

Visas: If you're traveling to another country, you may need to apply for a tourist visa. This could require paying a visit, or sending your passport, to a foreign embassy or consulate in the U.S. Application fees typically run from \$50 to \$200. Visit the U.S. Bureau of Consular Affairs to learn more. **TSA PreCheck and Global Entry:** A travel reward credit card like the <u>Capital One card</u>, gives you up to a \$85 credit towards these programs.

Confused about the two programs? Here's the difference: **TSA Precheck** (\$85) puts you in a faster security line at U.S. airports.

Global Entry (\$100) includes TSA Precheck and adds expedited customs screening upon your return from international trips.These programs can help you zip through airport security lines.

Before you apply, give yourself a few weeks to fill out the online application and visit an enrollment center for fingerprinting and an ID check.

You must already have a valid U.S. passport to apply for Global Entry, and you must participate in an interview at a designated enrollment center. Once approved, your status lasts five years. Most interviews last about five minutes, it's very easy!

A packing cube set, like <u>these on Amazon</u>, can help you save almost as much space as folding. Plus, keep you significantly more organized. And this is why I love packing cubes. It makes my life so much easier on the road.

Traveler Tip: If you stick a travel size fabric softener spray bottle in a plastic ziplock bag in one of your shoes, you can use it at your destination to get out any wrinkles and keep your clothes smelling fresh.

The Secret Packing Cube Hack

Here is what I do. I roll my clothes and pack them in <u>my packing cubes</u> organize by clothing garment. So the basics like pants, shirts, bedtime outfits, etc. Fill in your shoes with items like socks and place them around the packing cubes, where the gaps are. Lastly, not everything needs a packing cube. You may want to lay thick sweaters or jackets flat.

This way, **you get the best of both worlds**. The cubes keep your garments organized and rolling technique allows you to fit more inside the cube. VIOLA!
